No Go on the Caldwell Stoplight

You may recall hearing (or reading in this space) that consideration was being given to the installation of a traffic light on Caldwell Avenue near the entrance to the Bunker Hill forest preserve. The ECA recently received

word that the required traffic study determined that a traffic signal was unwarranted at this time. The ECA begs to differ with the study’s conclusion and continues to support the idea in the interest of neighborhood safety.

The Garden Corner

With a little bit of prodding, we were able to get Mary Jo Garnier, our resident master gardener and ECA Beautification Director, to stop raking fall leaves long enough to provide us with this near-year-end report on the state of Edgebrook’s public spaces.

The gardens have been put to bed for the winter, and they should be able to weather the winter just fine. In all, this season, ten truckloads of mulch were put down, and more than 1000 perennials, annuals, bulbs and bushes were planted and 60 bushes and trees were pruned. This year end marks the conclusion of our state grant, which helped care for the raised beds in the business district. The final funds from the grant were spent on a major planting of asters to help in the control of the bagworms.

You may have noticed that three trees were cut down on the south side of Devon Avenue between the railroad tracks and Central

Avenue. The city did this, as the trees were heavily damaged by the pests. These should be replaced in the spring. Several trees remain afflicted with bagworms—the forestry department is to remove the bagworm shelters in the coming month.

The Ginny Mose Triangle Garden soon will be decorated by Girl Scout troop 20373 to light up our little corner of the world. Join us November 29, 2009, at 6 PM for our annual lighting ceremony, at which carols, cookies, hot chocolate, and good cheer will be served!
