Winter Gardening—Dormant Pruning

It may seem counter-intuitive, but cutting the branches of your trees encourages growth. The process, called dormant pruning, is best performed from late January to early March and, correctly done, improves plant health.

The perfect time to examine your plants for problems is in the winter when the branch system, minus leaves, is open for inspection. Look for dead, diseased or damaged plant material and remove it. Remove crossing or rubbing branches that will cause future damage. Thin and cut back limbs per the plant's natural growing characteristics.

Renewal pruning, a process carried out over a period of two to four years, is the gradual thinning of overgrown stems and limbs to enable more light to reach the base of the plant and stimulate new growth. With the number of buds reduced in the winter, the remaining buds get more of the food stored in the roots and will grow healthier in the spring.

Check with your gardening expert before you tackle this winter gardening task. A little time spent in the garden in January will lead to healthier and more vibrant gardens in the spring.

An Edgebrookian You Should Know—Paul Engleman

Edgebrook residents and ECA members should not be unfamiliar with the name Paul Engleman. Paul served a term on the ECA board as newsletter editor.

A freelance writer with stories in major magazines, Paul worked for nine years at Playboy as a proofreader and publicist (don't ask—he won't tell). He is the author of eight novels.

Dead in Center Field, Paul's first novel, was published in 1983 and introduced private eye Mark

Renzler. Paul's novel won the coveted Shamus Award for best private eye paperback original in 1984. Long out of print, it has recently been released by Allerona Press and is available at amazon.com. Several of Paul's other books are available at the Chicago Public Library.

Do yourself a favor and check out *Dead in Center Field*. Studs Terkel said that "Engleman is a deft storyteller with a quirky touch." Edgebrookians will probably just say, "That's our boy. Way to go, Paul."
